ACTIVITIES FOR VISITORS

One of the objectives of the MIAU is to bring art closer to all people. In this sense, guided tours and workshops of artistic activities linked to urban art emerge as a necessity for the museum. The workshops and visits are aimed at schools as well as other groups, associations, families or groups of friends

Although the vast majority of the interventions are mural paintings, there are also other types: land-art, sculptures, pixelated tiles, cross-stitch rope intervention, vertical parking of crushed cars, intervention in water registers and photos in stone. As it is an open-air museum, its visit is very pleasant since it is done by walking through the town, being able to enjoy the art and the landscape simultaneously.



Groups of at least 10 people are made. The visit begins in the assembly hall with an explanation of what the MIAU project is and an explanation of Urban Art with projections of images made during the festivals already held. Afterwards, there is a walk through the museum with a duration of about two hours.



Aimed at people of any age, the objective of this workshop is to transmit the basic notions of the graffiti technique.

It will show the steps to follow to develop a work in this technique, as well as the jargon used to name the different elements of a work and the materials. The different steps will be taught before painting, planning, protection measures, preparation of the support and development of the mural, explaining the tricks of the technique, its correct application, maintenance and optimization of the materials.

Something very important when painting with this technique is the correct use of security measures. For this, the basic protection measures will be given and their use and application will be explained.
